

Robert P. Bremner '62 on Chairman of the Fed

Monday, October 23, 6:00 pm



Robert P. Bremner travels from Washington, D.C. to share his latest biography, *Chairman of the Fed*, published by Yale University Press. It chronicles William McChesney Martin, Jr. (1906-1998), the first paid president of the New York Stock Exchange and the chairman of the Federal Reserve System under Presidents Truman to Nixon. The book tells Martin's remarkable life story and explains his lasting impact on the NYSE and the Fed, both troubled institutions that Martin transformed. It provides an inside look into the economic deliberations of five presidential administrations and describes Martin's battles to

bring about ethical and intelligent regulation of U.S. financial markets. His experiences shed light not only on the evolution of the American financial system but also on critical issues confronting the system today. Mr. Bremner began his career with the World Bank in Washington, D.C. and has been an investment banker and management consultant. He is a former small business owner and currently serves as a public trustee for a large mutual fund management company. Join Mr. Bremner in the Library for cocktails at 6:00 pm and for his talk at 6:30 pm. He will discuss Martin's groundbreaking career and his leadership in trying times.



An award-winning historian and biographer of Lafayette, John Hancock, and Noah Webster, Mr. Unger will share his research on this seminal figure in American history. Visiting Chef Scott Conant

Tuesday, October 17, 6:00 pm Scott Conant, Executive Chef/Owner of L'Impero and Alto restaurants in Midtown, joins members in the Roof Dining Room for an evening of refined Italian cuisine. While studying at the Culinary Institute of America, Chef Conant interned at San Domenico under Chef Paul Bartolotta, later becoming the sous chef. In 1995, Chef Cesare Casella tapped him as chef de cuisine at Pino Luongo's Il Toscanaccio, where he learned rustic Tuscan fare. Since the beginning of his culinary career, Chef Conant has shown a single-minded determination to understand the full spectrum of Italian cuisine. From his years of mastering alta cucina at San Domenico to his explorations of cucina rustica in the trattorias of the Italian countryside, he has sought to surround himself with a diversity of perspectives to



better inform his personal style. His time in Italy reaffirmed his belief that cooking is all about honesty, integrity, and

soul. As a result, Chef Conant's cooking incorporates classic Italian cuisine with his own sense of American ingenuity. Since launching L'Impero in Tudor City in the fall 2002, praise for Chef Conant's food has been effusive and unanimous. The New York Times awarded him an exuberant three-star review in December 2002, and Gourmet concluded that he "raises the roof on the Manhattan school of Italian cooking." Alto continues the trend with modern, sophisticated Northern Italian cuisine in a sleek dining room. Bill Boggs, Emmy award-winning television personality and host of the upcoming show "By the Glass" on the Television Food Network, will join Chef Conant for the live three-course dinner and demonstration. The cost is \$85 per person, plus tax and gratuity, which includes a copy of Scott Conant's New Italian Cooking, to be signed by the chef. Reservations are required by October 13 and will be subject to the cancellation fee.

Event Cancellation Policy — The Club requires reservations for all events with fees. For these events for which reservations are required, members have up until 2 days before the day of the event to cancel their reservation without incurring a cancellation fee. This cancellation policy does not apply to gratis events, such as lectures and monthly gatherings. Cancellations or no-shows for any All-lvy events held at other clubs are subject to full charge after the 2 day deadline. Any exceptions to this cancellation policy will be noted in the event description in the Newsletter.



legendary body of work. In addition to her magazine work, Ms. Leibovitz has created influential advertising campaigns for American Express, Gap, Givenchy, The Sopranos, and the Milk Board. She was named a Living Legend by the Library of Congress in 2000 and one of the thirty-five Innovators of Our Time by Smithsonian magazine in 2005. The cost for this guided tour is \$15 per person. Prof. Steven B. Smith

Thursday, November 9, 6:00 pm "Was Leo Strauss a Neo-Conservative?"

Interest in Leo Strauss is greater now than at any time since his death, mostly because of the purported link between his thought and the political movement known as neoconservatism. Professor Steven B. Smith presents his latest book, *Reading Leo Strauss*, which looks at the controversial political philosopher Leo Strauss and



examines his views on politics, philosophy, and religion. He surprisingly depicts

Strauss not as the high priest of neoconservatism but as a friend of liberal democracy—perhaps the best defender democracy has ever had. Moreover, he shows that Strauss's defense of liberal democracy was closely connected to his skepticism of both the extreme Left and extreme Right. Steven B. Smith is the Alfred Cowles Professor of Political Science at Yale and has taught at the university since 1984. He has been the Master of Branford College for the past ten years. Debate the question at hand in the Library over cocktails at 6:00 pm, followed by Professor Smith's talk at 6:30 pm.


